The Merino Week held in August with the National sale, AGM and function were well organised and enjoyed by all who attended. At Nampo Kaap, the Weskaap Merino show was held in September on the back of our highly successful Classic of 2022. Planning for the 2024 Merino Classic in Bloemfontein is already underway.
